Until 31 Oct: Gore of Yore at the Dickens House: Based upon Dickens's 'A Child's History of England' this exhibition has proved particularly popular with younger visitors to the House.

At the opening reception, Henry Hawksley transferred the presidency to Paul Schlicke. In all there were 134 delegates registered.

The programme of lectures and visits was well-organised, interesting and entertaining, and the closing, costumed reading of "Breach of Promise" (Scenes from Pickwick Papers) by members of the Bristol and Clifton Dickens Society – which predates the Fellowship itself – were a happy close to a very enjoyable conference.

A new HQ member, Herr Helmut Stibal, attending with his wife Else, put it in a nutshell-"It's like a happy family!"

Good to know that the aims of the Fellowship, and the influence of Charles Dickens are still so strongly realised.

CHELTENHAM FESTIVAL

Simon Callow will again be celebrating Dickens in a new piece at this year's Cheltenham Festival of Literature.

The performance will take place on Friday 17th October, 8.45-10pm, and there will be a discount of £2.00 for members of the Fellowship.

The Festival runs from 10th-19th October and features over 400 novelists and biographers, poets and storytellers, philosophers and explorers, artists and filmmakers.

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DICKENS STUDIES

The Charles Dickens Museum is offering an exciting new evening course taught by some of the leading experts on Dickens's life and works from 21 October to 9 December 2003.

The World of Charles Dickens course offers a unique approach to Dickens's personality, using the world's finest collection of Dickens related material. The subjects explore important aspects of Dickens's literary career and personal life, while tutors have been chosen to share their wide range of knowledge with students.

Andrew Xavier, curator of the Charles Dickens Museum, offers a behind-the-scenes look at the research collections; Dr Tony Williams, joint Honorary General Secretary of the Fellowship, leads an examination of Dickens's theatre; Anthony Burton, former curator at the Victoria and Albert Museum, looks at Dickens's illustrators and Doctor Leon Litvack examines Dickens's travels abroad.

Later in the course, the British Library's Dr Elizabeth James talks about Dickens's relationship with his publishers; Dickens's London is explored by Professor Andrew Sanders; Prof Malcolm Andrews, of the University of Canterbury looks at Dickens's public readings, and Prof Malcolm Slater gives a timely talk on Dickens and Christmas.

The course includes access to the research facilities at the Charles Dickens Museum, an invitation to the private view of the next special exhibition at the museum and handling of rare artefacts from the collection.

The course runs on Tuesdays from 6.30-8.00pm. The cost is $\pounds100$ ($\pounds80$ student concession fee.).
